A HARVARD PROFESSOR, A SHOE CLOSET AND AN AMATEUR ARCHAEOLOGIST

Do you have any idea what these three items have in common? They are all linked to the history of The Shelter Island Public Library.

The Harvard Professor was Eben Norton Horsford - who married a descendant of one of Shelter Island's founding families and went on to become lord of Sylvester Manor. He donated 280 volumes to the first library.

The shoe closet was in the Old Store, a building located not far from the present library that served as a post office, telegraph station and local meeting place. That little closet is where the library's first volumes were held. After a fire in 1891, a new library was built on a nearby lot.



The amateur archaeologist was Cornelia Horsford, daughter of Eben, and the Library's first President. You may know her from her portrait in the library's main room, but what you might not know about her is that she wrote books on the Vikings in North America!
