We're proud to announce that Shelter Island Public Library has been designated a five-star library for 2020 by *Library Journal*. SON OF THE SOUTH

The library is pleased to be collaborating with the Shelter Island Health and Wellness Alliance in presenting another special program in the *Necessary Bridges* series. Please join us for a conversation with Bob Zellner, an early civil rights leader and former East End resident, who has devoted his life to the fight for racial justice. Zellner's bestselling autobiography, *The Wrong Side of Murder Creek*, has recently been adapted into a feature film produced by Spike Lee, entitled *Son of the South*. It is scheduled for release in early February. Zellner's fellow Alabama native Diane McWhorter, former Shelter Islander and author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning civil rights history of Birmingham, *Carry Me Home*, will facilitate this inspiring discussion of the struggle for racial equality, from the 1950's until now. MY COUNTRY TIS OF ...? WITH JULES FEIFFER AND ROBERT LIPSYTE: Friday, February 12th, 7:00pm

Jules Feiffer, born in that hard year of 1929, reflects on that hard year of 2020 and how we got there from the American dream of his youth to the gated community of his old age. From the perspective of 65 years as an Oscar-winning, Pulitzer Prize-winning political cartoonist and social commentator, Feiffer wonders if Dr. King's declaration that the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice, was overly optimistic. How much will the changes in the world today affect the way we live and love, raise our children and choose our future leaders?

SON OF THE SOUTH: A CONVERSATION WITH BOB ZELLNER AND DIANE MCWHORTER: Friday, February 19th, 7:00pm

Bob Zellner, who was born and raised in Alabama, was the son and grandson of Ku Klux Klan members. His commitment to racial equality was rooted in religion, a faith he found growing up the son of a Methodist minister. Zellner, who became interested in civil rights during college, went on to become the first white field secretary of SNCC. His commitment to the Movement was continually, and often violently, tested by white supremacists. Journalist and Pulitzer Prize winning author Diane McWhorter (*Carry Me Home*) will join Mr. Zellner to talk about his work in the civil rights movement, the upcoming film based on his memoir, and his thoughts about the fight for social justice today. This program is presented in collaboration with the Shelter Island Health and Wellness Alliance as part of the *Necessary Bridges* ongoing series.

MUSICIAN/COMPOSER PAT IRWIN AND DAVID BROWNE IN CONVERSATION: Friday, February 26th, 7:00pm

Pat Irwin has had an eclectic career as a performer and composer. You've probably heard his music - whether on a TV or film soundtrack or for cartoons such as "SpongeBob Squarepants." Irwin was a major presence on the New York rock scene of the late 70's and early 80's. A founding member of 8-Eyed Spy and The Raybeats, he also performed with the B-52's. His current band, SUSS has released a new record called *Promise*. Irwin teaches film and music composition at Brooklyn College and New York University. David Browne is a senior writer at *Rolling Stone* and a longtime music journalist. His work has appeared in the *New York Times*, *Time*, *Spin*, and many other outlets. He was the music critic at the *New York Daily News* and then, at *Entertainment Weekly*. Browne is the author of several books. Join us for what is sure to be a fascinating and wide-ranging discussion of the music world - then and now.



Tuesday, February 9th, 4:30pm



ADULT CRAFT: POLYMER CLAY COASTERS: Pick up Between: Tuesday, February 16th and Saturday, February 20th


