PSANKA EGGS



Next time you visit, please be sure to check out our display case. The Cava family of Shelter Island has created a beautiful collection of Psanka eggs. Psanka is an ancient Ukranian egg decorating technique. "Writers" use melted beeswax to seal in layers of color. After successive dying and

sealing, the wax is melted to reveal a patterned egg! The spring tradition predates Christianity and later became part of the Easter tradition. Although the eggs in this collection are made employing the ancient technique, the designs are far from traditional.

"LONG ISLAND MIGRANT LABOR CAMPS: DUST FOR BLOOD" WITH MARK A. TORRES

Friday, April 9th, 7:00pm

Long Island Migrant Labor Camps: Dust for Blood is the riveting true account of the migrant labor camps in Suffolk County from their inception during World War II through 1960. Author Mark Torres will discuss the dark history of the camps including the suffering of the inhabitants; the cause and effect of the camps; and the factors which led to their eventual decline. Mr. Torres will also cover the heroic efforts of those who were outspoken critics of the deplorable conditions of the camps and fought to improve the lives of migrant workers on the eastern end of Long Island during this time period.

It's not just the shape of their daily lives that is different as adults, it's everything: their families, their communities, their racial identities. Weaving together multiple strands and generations of this family, from the Deep South to California, from the 1950s to the 1990s, Brit Bennett produces a story that is a riveting, emotional family story.

Lady in the Lake by Laura Lippman: Monday, April 26th, 5:00pm

In 1960's Baltimore, Maddie Schwartz is a pampered housewife who bolts from her marriage with the intention of living a passionate, meaningful life. Working as a journalist, and helping the police, she becomes interested in the case of Cleo Sherwood, a black woman whose body is found in the fountain of a city park lake. According to *Kirkus Reviews*, Lippman's standalone work explores "The racism, classism, and sexism of 50 years ago wrapped up in a stylish, sexy, suspenseful period drama about a newsroom and the city it covers."
