FKIDAY NIGHT DIALOGUES

PASTOR BILL GRIMBOL - MAKING A HABIT OF HOPE: Friday, May 5th, 7:00pm

We live in spiritually troubling times. There is ample chaos and division. There is a lack of compromise, community, and common ground. Above all else, there is a lack of genuine hope. HOPE, in today's chaotic and often crazy world, will not come easily. It cannot be about success, and how much stuff we might own. Hope will not come cheap. It will require real commitment. It will present great challenges for change. It will need all of us to seek to be mature. Please join us as "Pastor Bill" talks about how we can come together to create a legacy of hope.

FISHERFOLK; FISHERSONGS: FISHERMEN'S WORK, LIFE & HARDSHIPS AS TOLD THROUGH HISTORIC AND CONTEMPORARY SONGS WITH STEPHEN SANFILIPPO: Friday, May 19th, 7:00pm 🍖

A native Long Islander, Stephen has performed songs of the maritime trades throughout Long Island and Virginia since the 1970s. In "Fisherfolk" he performs songs of Long Island eel spearers and clammers, Chesapeake oystermen, Maine lobstermen, fishermen of the British Isles, Sicily, Maritime Canada and Long Island.

THE THIRD ACT WITH JOSH SAPAN: Friday, May 26th, 7:00pm

Josh Sapan's book, The Third Act, features people who are doing extraordinary things later in their career. Some are well known, including Jane Fonda, Alan Alda, Robert Redford and Norman Lear. There are also some equally powerful and moving unknown acts in the book by people you meet every day. In a discussion surrounding The Third Act, author Josh Sapan will be joined by remarkable people from the area including Susan Dempsey, Bill Persky & Joshua Potter.



Join historian, author, and former Newsday reporter Bill Bleyer for this presentation about the 1840 accident that claimed the lives of all but four of the approximately 150 on board and remains the worst maritime disaster in the history of Long Island. The pilot tried to head for shore only to have the steering ropes burn through. The engineers could not stop the steam engine so the crew attempted to launch the three lifeboats but all were lost. Hear the tales of the lost and the survivors in this fascinating talk.



BLACK BREWERS AND DISTILLERS: Wednesday, May 10th, 7:00pm

A History of African Americans in Brewing and Distilling explores and delves into the impact that African-Americans in distilling and brewing have made in this country. The talk will explore the stories of enslaved women brewers and enslaved men who distilled for their owners without recognition, Black women moonshiners across the country during Prohibition, the incredibly creative mixologists of the 1800s who created drinks we still partake in today, and also spotlight current day mixologists, brewers, and distillers that are changing the face of spirits today.

When television began in the late 1940s, advertising was already a vital part of the picture. Throughout the 1950s, advertisers were fully in charge, controlling the content of a large part of prime time, and selling their products through live demonstrations, celebrity testimonials, inventive animation, and ads that integrated directly into the program. With the shift away from full sponsorship, a new era of creativity emerged, as advertisers embraced new techniques and approaches. This talk will look at how advertising changed during television's first two decades and the important role it played in convincing viewers that the key to happiness lay in guite literally buying their way into the American dream.
